

Crudwell CE Primary School

At school this term our value for the term is compassion. In the run up to Christmas, we will be reflecting on what this means and the positive impact we can have when we behave compassionately towards others.

We have taught the children that empathy + action = compassion and we have shared practical examples and stories from the Bible to illustrate this. Being compassionate towards others creates a sense of belonging, respect and trust and this permeates all we do at Crudwell. I am never surprised or happier than when I see the children behaving in this way at school, with kindness and respect for others.

This week as I was showing a family around the school, one of our year 5 pupils spontaneously offered to help. Compassion in action! He saw a need and acted. He talked articulately about his school and what he enjoyed most about being part of Crudwell. The family were grateful and really impressed.

Compassion is always modelled by our team. At Crudwell, we think deeply about how we can develop this sense of belonging for the children at school. How can we keep them safe? Do the children feel they can talk to adults they trust? How can we support families in maintaining good attendance? What opportunities are there we can give the children to develop key communication skills and teamwork? What opportunities are there to take part in festivals that represent the school?

From whole school councils that empower the children to create change, sports festivals and school discos, to learning in class, we are always trying to engender this sense of belonging because when children feel happy and safe they are, crucially, also in a great space to learn.

Crudwell Village Hall

Most likely by the time you read this, the path on the recreation ground at the village hall will be finished and we will have planted the first trees and shrubs of our new park.

This work has taken a huge amount of effort from many people, but I want to pay special thanks to Terri Murphy and Hilary Warner for helping us identify, source, and plant these wonderful new additions. All are carefully chosen; they are native species, beloved by other wildlife and, I'm told, produce fantastic colours throughout the year. They will take some maintaining in their early years of life but hopefully will have been adopted by volunteers – including by some in their early years themselves - and be given all the love they need as they settle into their new home.

We'll also be marking out the new football pitch and installing new goalposts ready for the annual Boxing Day match. Come along and watch the fun if you get the chance. The sideline heckling is its defining characteristic and as many voices as possible are welcome.

So, what's to come? Well, as well as a new path, you'll notice several new patches set aside for picnic tables. We'll begin investigating how best to fill those spaces and examine the best locations for benches too. And we have a couple of volunteers who've stepped up to take charge of planning, funding, and building a pump track for bikes at the bottom end of the field. Thanks to Leon Horton and Claire Buxton for taking this on!

In the absence of a village shop, we've also been talking with a local supplier of vending machines, which can be stocked with local produce and snacks. This should be installed (near the bike maintenance station on the side of the hall) very soon and we're also looking at adding a separate vending machine for milk and dairy products to save the late dashes to Malmesbury for essentials.

As you can see there's lots to do and we've noticed that we're a bit short of different faces, views, and pairs of hands for the committee. We already have a couple who've put up their hand for maybe joining us but, if you're keen, just let me know.

Parish Council and Community Report Dec 24

Community Support

Following the Parish Council's agreement to actively sponsor and manage the financing of this journal, we are very pleased that our editor, Katie Hawkins compiled the November edition which was made available online here and distributed by our volunteer team organised by Charlotte Bullock. The Council at its November meeting agreed to the printing and distribution of the December edition to all households, however in order to maintain publication at an affordable cost to the parish the following processes will take place in the New Year.

- Advertisers and some contributors will be asked to donate to the PC on a tariff which will be determined by the advertisement size.
- Distribution of paper copies will be incrementally decreased as demand for online copy increases.
- Those who do not wish for a paper copy may request a small window sticker which will inform the distributors not to deliver to those addresses. These opt out stickers will be obtained by mailing the editor at woicrudwell@gmail.com. It is hoped that the stickers will be available for the December distribution.
- Printing will be incrementally reduced during the new year in order to reduce costs therefore keeping the journal within the budget allocated by the PC.
- Forms will be also be made available in the New Year at the Post Office and pubs where you will be able to request the continuation of paper copy delivery.
- The PC intends that the online version of the journal will become the norm and will, in future, of necessity
 only distribute to those who cannot access the online version in future, although the paper copy will always
 be distributed where needed.

Parish Council

The Parish Council last met on Tuesday the 12th of November in the Village Hall. Minutes of all meetings are published on the council website at:

http://www.crudwell-pc.gov.uk/category/agenda/ together with the agenda for the next meeting which will take place at 7:00 PM on Tuesday the 3rd of December 2024 in Crudwell Primary School. Public speaking is permitted during the first ten minutes of the meeting, and you are, if you wish able to attend.

Two councillors attended a meeting of stakeholders held to look at the worsening problems associated with parking in the vicinity of the school and Church, particularly at drop off and pick up times. The meeting was also attended by representatives of the Church, the Primary School, farming and local residents. A number of ideas were considered which could help to ease congestion and make the area less hazardous. Members of group will seek to follow up with actions designed to ease congestion and make the area safer.

Councillor Gary Lawes has now resigned from the Council; Gary has been a significant contributor to Council work for a number of years, especially with regard to our task of reviewing and commenting on planning applications. We are most grateful to Gary for his work for our community and wish him well in the future. There are currently now three vacancies for Parish Councillors, if you are interested in joining the council then please contact our parish clerk at parish.clerk@crudwell-pc.gov.uk.

Neighbourhood Plan Report Dec 24

2021 Neighbourhood Plan; Tuners Lane Planning Application PL/2023/09595

This site was allocated by policy in the 2021 Crudwell Neighbourhood Plan and a Community Liaison Group of Councillors and residents have been engaged with the agents to help ensure that the development meets our requirements in terms of affordable housing and design.

A revised set and plans and documentation was recently published by the agents of the Tuners Lane development together with a new consultation response date of 12/11/2024. The changes to the plans are to address concerns raised by Wiltshire Council officers and also to address the Parish Council's objection with respect to some detailed design issues. The Parish Council has requested that the agents should hold a public exhibition for councillors and residents where the revised plans and improvements to design can be reviewed. We will inform you of the time date and venue when this has been agreed. Meanwhile the Planning Application for the site in Tuners Lane remains called in by Councillor Berry.

Neighbourhood Plan Review to 2038

- The Crudwell Neighbourhood Plan was "made" (completed and included in Wiltshire Council Local Plan) in May 2021. This gives us protection from speculative planning applications for unwanted developments for five years to May 2026.
- In 2023 the Parish Council agreed to commence a review of the 2021 plan to align with the emerging Wiltshire Local Plan which will state Wiltshire's housing requirements to 2038.
- Discussions are taking place with Neighbourhood Steering Group members and landowners who responded to the call for sites made as part of our 2023 consultation. The discussions are focussed on demonstrating the suitability and deliverability of housing on these sites which would meet the parish's requirement for new homes by 2038.
- Work on the other areas of policy continues, these new policy areas include: Proposed protected green spaces, The green network and hedgerow, Business Park, Business Development and additional Parking Facilities Policy to ease congestion at the Primary School, also a new Design Guide to meet Government requirements.
- We shall of course to continue to consult with you via this journal again at all stages of the new plan's development and via formal consultations, the next of these is Regulation 14. Changes in Government policy and other external issues which are beyond our control mean that we have had to revise our plan timetable, and we now anticipate that Reg 14 will take place during the Spring of 2025.
